ECON 2901D Guided Studies in Current Economic Problems I

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Purpose of this Course

This course is divided into two parts. The first part contains several workshops that focus on research methodology, use of economic data, writing skills, and presentation techniques. The second part involves group consultations, classroom discussions and presentation of research projects. Students are expected not only to gain basic knowledge in the design of an appropriate research project but also to improve their public speaking and overall writing abilities.

Learning Outcomes

After taking this course, students should be able to carry out and present the findings of their own research project.

Grading

Part 1: STOT Workshops (20%)

- (i) To encourage students to attend the STOT workshops, attendance is counted as a part of the course assessment. **3% of the final grade is** assigned to the student's attendance.
- (ii) To encourage students to better understand the materials covered in the STOT workshops, assignments are given and graded. 17% of the final grade is allocated to the STOT-workshops assignments.

Part 2: Research Project (80%)

You are expected to meet the course instructor regularly throughout the term. We will meet on zoom in regular class times (see time schedule below) and also by special appointment. You can email the instructor to set up a private zoom meeting.

Poster Presentation

Students are required to produce a poster for their group project and present their work in a public exhibition at the end of April. Students are expected to explain their work to an audience with little or no formal economics training. **Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our plan at the moment is for you to produce a 10-minute video presentation which we will post online.** The poster is due on the same day as the day the video is presented.
