Course Description

This course provides a conceptual framework that helps us understand China's growth over the three decades since the late 1970s and its recent slowdown. We will: (i) explore the politico-economic arrangements that have been underpinning China's high growth; (ii) analyze the institutional changes that may be responsible for the recent slowdown; (iii) discuss timely topics including the transformation of the financial sector, innovation, industrial policy, China-US trade war and technological gap.
